This session will give learners the opportunity to refresh their knowledge around the correct techniques for administering Zoladex, including the correct use, indication for, contraindications compatibility and the roots of administration by Intramuscular and Subcutaneous Injections, consideration will also be given to the safety precautions needed whilst administering injections to service users. There will be time to allow the learners to practice within a simulated learning setting, for both types of injection if required.



Assessment

The assessment for this course will be through a summative Knowledge assessment. Practical practice observation will be given if required by the candidates. Learners should have already been assessed as competent during clinical practice.



- Discuss the indication for the uses of Zoladex, the contraindication, compatibility and routes of administration of Zoladex
- List the five reasons why medication may be given by injection (parenteral route)
- Differentiate between the structures involved and uses of the intramuscular (IM) and subcutaneous (SC)
- Outline factors influencing choice of syringes and needles
- Outline sites, basic preparation and administration techniques for the IM and SC routes
- Recognise the importance of universal precautions when giving injections

What's covered on the day?

This course has been designed to enable delegates to develop the essential knowledge and skills for managing medications within a health and social care setting. It is suitable for nurses and carers who are responsible and accountable for dispensing, administering and managing medicines within practice. It will cover key information on laws, legislations, classifications of medicines. It will give staff the opportunity to refresh and expand knowledge on the routes of administration as well as discussing what actions to take when things go wrong. Understand and identify the legislation relating to and impacting on Care Planning & Record Keeping in relation to medication management. Make sure Record Keeping confirms and complies with requirements from legislation and would be measurable when audited. There will be a practical element to the course where delegates will have simulated competency on the administration of medication.



Assessment

The tutor will be actively monitoring and reviewing the learner's contributions and understanding throughout the session with a series of group work exercises and discussions. Learners will complete a knowledge assessment at the end of the course. allowing them to demonstrate their understanding of the subject material, it will also equip learners to undertake a competency assessment whilst in their practice setting. There will be simulated practice which will allow delegates to administer medication.

The information given within this half day training session, will equip learners with the essential knowledge of the anticoagulant therapies that are available at present, as well as looking at the importance of appropriate management and monitoring of service users who receive this therapy.



Assessment

There are no summative assessments as part of this course, although knowledge will be checked throughout the course delivery and at the end in the form of a knowledge assessment



- State the indication for anticoagulation therapy
- Describe the mode of action of oral and parental anticoagulants that are currently available
- Advise on the importance of regular INR monitoring
- Identify and resolve common medicines management issues in anticoagulant patients
- Follow best practice guidance to improve safe use of anticoagulants
- Promote safe use of anticoagulants
- Provide appropriate information to patients and their carers to help them to manage their therapy

Apomorphine Infusion Pump Awareness (APO-Go)

This half day course is aimed at health professional that deliver Apomorphine medication via a pump to Parkinson's Disease Patients. It examines the setting up of an APOgo pump to a Mark 3 state. It also examines the drug apomorphine hydrochloride.

An essential introduction to anyone using the APO-go pump.



Assessment

As this is a theoretical course a knowledge assessment will also be carried out at the end of the day. The tutor will be actively monitoring and reviewing the learner's contributions and understanding throughout the session with a series of group work exercises and discussions



- Work safely with the Apo-go syringe driver
- List the indications of using a syringe driver
- Discuss the legal and professional considerations around syringe driver use
- Review the procedure for setting up an Apo-go syringe driver
- Identify the potential sites to use when setting up a syringe driver and where to avoid
- Have an increased knowledge of the drug to be able to work effectively, and efficiently

Autism Awareness and Autistic Spectrum Disorders

They will also understand what steps to take whilst calling the emergency services.



Assessment

A competency assessment will take place at the end of the session, supervised by our Tutor allowing delegates to return to the workplace confident in their skills to assess and treat an emergency situation with what they are being faced with.

This comprehensive two-day course covers everything the student needs to know to be able to train staff if they are confronted with an unresponsive non-breathing casualty that requires Basic Life Support and Automated External Defibrillation. It follows the procedures laid down in the current Resuscitation Council UK Guidelines 2015 and builds on the algorithm for CPR. The course format provides ample opportunities for students to practice both their teaching skills and the skills required for Basic Life Support and AED, so that after the course they are more confident they could teach this subject.



Assessment

Delegates will be assessed continuously throughout the session by the Tutor and will conduct a supervised training session. This will lead to competence in BSL and AED and a Competency certificate in Training Delivery Skills. A certificate of attendance will be awarded and the certificates will be valid for three years, but it is advised that a refresher is undertaken annually.

What's covered on the day?

The aim of this course is to provide the learner with an overview of using bed rails and the knowledge and understanding to be able to work to best practice. Bed rails can be very effective when used correctly. However, data shows that accidents still happen and that they don?€™t prevent falls and can introduce other risks. Following some serious case reviews, and the publicity received around the use of bed rails, this course equips staff teams with the essential knowledge of the potential risks and how to use bed rails safely.



Assessment

There is no formal summative assessment, as part of this course. Learners knowledge and understanding will be checked throughout the course delivery and a knowledge assessment will be undertaken at the end to evidence the understanding of the individual.



- Understand knowledge and best practice in the safe use of bed rails
- Explain why bed rails should always be a last resort
- Understand the potential risks associated with bed rails
- Ascertain how to reduce risks and appropriate bed rail set up
- Follow safety guidelines as published by the Health and Safety Executive and in line with company policies and procedures

Behaviour that Challenges

People may sometimes behave in a way that is considered challenging and can be very distressing for the person, their families and carers. This session will explore the reasons theoretically as to why a person might be behaving in this way, enabling you as the primary care giver to feel more confident with enhanced skills to deal with these situations, explore why they may be occurring and how to minimise these, with the possibility of preventing them occurring.



Assessment

A knowledge assessment will be completed by the learners to allow them to demonstrate an effective understanding of the learning outcomes. There is no practical application of any breakaway techniques included in this course. A Certificate of Attendance will also be issued, valid for 3 years.



- Define what is meant by the term 'behaviour that challenges'
- Identify potential triggers and for behaviour that we find difficult
- Explain how communication and the person centred approach has an effect on behaviours
- Outline the continuum of aggression, identifying different behaviours and what de-escalation interventions can be used
- Understand the importance of an effective de-brief and explain the consequences of behaviours
- Describe what is meant by the term 'reasonable force'
- Apply the principles of the Mental Capacity Act 2005 and Deprivation of Liberties Safeguards to practical situations

Blood Borne Viruses Awareness

This awareness course will allow learners to define what a blood borne virus is, understand about the possible transmission methods and how they can be reduced. It will highlight to learners about the importance of using correct personal protective equipment and why immunisation is required. It will also refresh staff with how to deal with sharps injuries if one should be sustained.



Assessment

The learners in attendance will complete a knowledge assessment at the end of the course, to demonstrate that the information delivered has been retained and allow them to demonstrate their knowledge on the subject of BBVs.

- List the main BBVs of concern
- Identify the main methods of viral transmission
- Recall the PPE required to help prevent the transmission of BBVs
- Explain the importance of immunisation and how it is effective
- List the steps necessary to manage a sharps injury

How to manage behaviour change in relation to health promotion and vaccine hesitancy, How to apply models of behaviour change and motivational interviewing during short term interventions or conversations with an individual around vaccinations.



Assessment

There is a formal assessment involved in this course, and learners will undertake this towards the end of the virtual course. Along with following the course content in the workbook included.



- Discuss the importance of vaccines and the features of vaccination programs

It will then examine intervention techniques, recognising triggers and how staff can best deal with the situation in hand. Finally, it will look at post event support. The course follows guidance from The Institute of Conflict Management and The SIA (Security Industry Authority.)



Assessment

Delegates will be assessed continuously throughout the session by the Tutor and will also complete a Knowledge Assessment. Participants will receive a Certificate of Attendance following the course, valid for 1 year.

This full day session will give the Registered Practitioners attending the opportunity to explore Bowel Assessment and Function, including Digital Rectal Examination (DRE) & Manual Removal of Faeces (MRF). It will equip the learners with a theoretical understanding of the importance of considering both of these as part of the wider bowel continence process & not as stand alone aspects. The learners will explore the key factors when looking at DRE & MRF as potential management of the patient's condition, including the cautions & contraindications of these procedures. Learners will have the opportunity to practice aspects of the skill in simulation, although will not be assessed formally, a declaration of selfcompetency will be issued to attendees for completion after a period of consolidation and supervision in the workplace, or in line with organisational policies. The learners will undertake a knowledge assessment during the day to ensure that the theoretical aspect of the course has been fully met.



Assessment

There will be a knowledge assessment at the end of this course, where learners will be required to meet an 80% mark to obtain a certificate of completion. It provides knowledge and practical guidance which, together with mentorship, should enable Health Care Assistants and registered nurses to fulfil this extended role.



Assessment

The attendees of this course will undertake a variety of assessment methods both whilst on the course and when in practice. There is a formal written exam on the day of the course. There is continued assessment through the day utilising a number of assessment processes There is an expectation that at least 20 patients will be assessed and treated within a 3 month period for the supervised competency to be completed.

The course is designed to ensure those Nurses and Health Care Assistants who are expected to irrigate, are able to do so confidently and safely. The course is aimed at Registered Healthcare Practitioners and HSW who are either new to, or returning to vaccination after a prolonged period will require specific training about the COVID-19 vaccine that has been included with in the two day new to skill immunisers course for HCP's and HSW.



Assessment

Learners will complete a knowledge assessment at the end of the course, as well as have the ability to practice in simulation the administration of a vaccine. Competency will be assessed in simulation initially but there will be the expectations that the delegates will receive further supervision and competency assessment in the workplace by a suitable assessor. A competency document will be issued to the learner so they are able to provide evidence of practice along with theoretical knowledge.

It will also identify if administration of the vaccine is required in the arm, or thigh and why this would be. Learners will develop their theoretical knowledge and will complete practical simulated procedures in the classroom, in order to complete their practical live competency in the workplace.



Assessment

Learners will complete a knowledge assessment at the end of the course. Delegates will need to receive further supervision and competency assessment in the workplace by a suitable assessor. A competency document will be issued to the learner so they are able to provide evidence of practice along with theoretical knowledge around administrating vaccines.

The knowledge gained from this course will support champions to promote good practice in the prevention and control of infection whilst working in environments such as residential care homes, hospitals, supported living services and homecare services. This course has been developed and mapped to: DoH - The Health and Social Care Act 2008 -Code of Practice on the prevention and control of infections and related guidance.



Assessment

There will be no formal summative assessment of this course, although the tutor will utilise a range of teaching and assessment methods throughout the day to check knowledge and understanding as the day progresses. Each of the learners will leave with an action plan of development for implementing back in their respective workplaces.

It will give learners the tools to effectively support and nurture new staff members. Clinical mentorship is aimed at improving skills and knowledge of health care practitioners. It will encourage the learners to work as role models ultimately leading to provision of comprehensive quality health care services



Assessment

The trainer will utilise a range of teaching and assessment strategies to ensure the development and understanding of the learning outcomes. Learners will be expected to participate in all of the group activities. There will be a knowledge assessment held at the end of the course. This can then be included in the learner's portfolio of evidence to support their continuing professional development

It will equip the learners with all of the essential knowledge required to care for a patient who has a PICC line in place, how to administer antibiotics via the central line how to change the dressings, how to flush the PICC line to maintain patency. Including problem solving, risk assessment of potential problems and overview of other central venous devices that are commonly used in the community.



Assessment

Learners will complete a knowledge assessment at the end of the theory session, allowing them to evidence their understanding of the required criteria. A formal assessment and final competency sign off will take place back in the work environment and is dependent on the organizational policy and procedures.



Learning Outcomes

- To identify what cannulation is
- Develop and apply the knowledge needed in relation to legislations, policies and best practice of cannulation including gaining consent
- Review and correctly identify the anatomy and physiology involved in cannulation
- Identify the equipment needed for cannulation to take place, and the procedure for cannulation
- Identify the importance of good infection control procedures to minimise the risk of hospital acquired infections
- Identify potential complications from cannulation and measures to prevent or minimise
- \bullet Discuss and ensure understanding of cannula care and removal
- \bullet Review the anatomy and physiology of the venous system and circulation, paying attention to how

PICC lines are inserted.

- \bullet List the equipment required to perform IV the rapies via the PICC line
- Use the VIP Score criteria for assessing the suitability of the central line.
- Identify the potential hazards of central line therapies.

The practical session will allow the learners to develop the appropriate skills for inserting and monitoring a peripheral cannula, as well as running an IV infusion as well as mixing IV additives



Assessment

Learners will complete a knowledge assessment at the end of the theory session, allowing them to evidence their understanding of the required criteria. The practical session will include simulated practice – formal assessment and final competency sign off will take place back in the work environment and is dependent on the organisational policy and procedures.



- Develop and apply the knowledge needed in relation to legislations, policies and best practice of intravenous medications including gaining consent
- Identify the importance of good infection control procedures to minimise the risk of hospital acquired infections
- To recognise safe storage of medications
- To identify ways to ensure safety and reduce the risk of errors

- Identify the equipment needed for intravenous medication and the procedure for safe administration
- Identify potential complications from vascular access devices and measures to prevent or minimise these
- Discuss and ensure understanding of care of vascular access devices

The practical session will allow the learners to develop the appropriate skills for inserting and monitoring a peripheral cannula, as well as running an IV infusion as well as mixing IV additives



Assessment

Learners will complete a knowledge assessment at the end of the theory session, allowing them to evidence their understanding of the required criteria. The practical session will include simulated practice – formal assessment and final competency sign off will take place back in the work environment and is dependent on the organisational policy and procedures.



- Review the anatomy and physiology of the venous system and circulation
- Discuss the legal and professional considerations when looking at cannulation and IV therapies
- List the equipment required when performing peripheral cannulation
- Use the VIPS score criteria for assessing the suitability of a peripheral cannula
- \bullet Explain the risks to the practitioner associated with healthcare sharps
- Demonstrate the practical skills of cannulating a peripheral vein
- Summarise the key reasons for intravenous infusions
- State the definitions of fluid and electrolyte balance
- Identify the potential hazards of intravenous therapy
- Show the correct practice of running and maintaining a lines patency
- Interpret a prescription for IV fluids and calculate the flow rate or drip rates for running IV infusions
- Apply the principles of medicines management when looking at IV therapies
- Demonstrate correct and safe practices when drawing up IV therapies and administering medications
- Evaluate the legal and professional responsibilities of administering IV infusions and IV therapies to a patient
- Describe the considerations that you would take as a practitioner when applying the Mental Capacity Ac

Assessment

This course is assessed through continual assessment during the session as well as a formal knowledge assessment at the end, which will allow the learners to demonstrate their knowledge and understanding of the learning materials and around Legionnaire's disease. A certificate of attendance will go alongside the knowledge assessment.



This session will cover all theoretical aspects relating to loss and bereavement within the workplace. The first part of the course will deal with the theoretical components of loss and bereavement, using established models of bereavement. It will then examine how coworkers such as nurses, carers and managers can be helped through the process.



Assessment

A knowledge assessment will take place at the end of the session, supervised by our Tutor allowing delegates to return to the workplace and put to practice what they have learnt. A Certificate of Attendance will also be issued, valid for 3 years.



- To identify what loss and bereavement is, so that the participant is able to discuss their own attitudes towards loss and bereavement
- To discuss the signs and symptoms of bereavement to help staff to recognise when it is occurring

- Discuss and ensure understanding of routing loss and bereavement for both service users and staff

Making Decisions: Advance Statements and Supporting Individual Choice

What's covered on the day?

This session will cover key aspects of legal and professional considerations when supporting individuals to make choice. It will equip learners with the knowledge of Advance Statements, Advance Statements and Living Wills and how these can be applied into nursing and care practices. Discussions will also be held around advocacy for the individual and the application of the principles of the Mental Capacity Act and how a person's previous decisions can be upheld or overridden depending on circumstances.



Assessment

There is no formal assessment during this course, the delegates will be assessed throughout the session and expected to take part in group activities and discussions. A certificate of attendance will be issued.



- Recognise what Advance Statements, Advance Decisions and Living Wills & how they apply to care delivery and practice
- List some of the circumstances when individuals may write an advance statement/decision
- Discuss when these decisions are 'activated' and would become appropriate within care practices.
- Describe how the Mental Capacity Act is relevant within this subject and if previous decisions would still be honoured
- Explain what Power of Attorney's are and how they apply to supporting individuals to make decisions
- Relate different practice methods to supporting individual choices on a day-to-day basis
- Recall when Advance Statements, Advance Decisions or Living Wills may not be honoured and nursing or medical decisions override the individual's choice
- Discuss when Best Interest Decisions may be applicable within this subject matter, and how they can support choice
- Identify where and how nursing and care staff can practice as the individual's advocate

What's covered on the day?

This course is delivered by one of our experienced trainers and is aimed at health and social care workers. The course looks at a variety of behaviours which pose difficulties for staff within care settings. Learners will explore how best to approach and manage occurrences of challenging and unpredictable behaviour. This course also enables learners to have an understanding and awareness of the reasons why a person may present with challenging behaviour. This is a theoretical course only, and will not include any breakaway techniques or physical interventions.



Assessment

As this is a theoretical course there is no practical assessment of learning, however, a knowledge assessment will be carried out. The tutor will be actively monitoring and reviewing the learners contributions and understanding and the learners will demonstrate this through the completed knowledge assessment during the course of the day.

- Explain how Communication and Person Centred Approach has an effect on behaviours
- Outline the Continuum of aggression, identifying different behaviours and what de-escalation interventions can be used

Students able to achieve all the outcomes will be awarded a Certificate of Attendance valid for a year.

Delegates will come away from this course with a working knowledge of the MCA and its relationship with DOLS, thus understanding how they can ensure that their every-day activities comply with both pieces of legislation.



Assessment

Delegates will be expected to take part in group discussions and activities throughout the course, they will also undertake a knowledge assessment at the end of their course to allow them to demonstrate their understanding of the subject matter, and use this as evidence towards their continuing professional development.

The Mental Capacity Act (MCA) and Deprivation of Liberties Safeguards (DOLS) were introduced with the aim of reinforcing the protection of vulnerable adults in care settings. The MCA all care and support that is delivered to people who may not be able to decide or act for themselves and is relevant to everybody who works in the health or social care. Delegates will come away from this course with an in depth working knowledge of the MCA and its relationship with DOLS, and applying it to practical scenarios within the workplace.



Assessment

Delegates will be expected to take part in group discussions and activities throughout the course, they will also undertake a knowledge assessment at the end of their course to allow them to demonstrate their understanding of the subject matter, and use this as evidence towards their continuing professional development. This course will benefit Registered Nurses and senior members of staff who are actively involved in the application of the MCA and DoLS into practice.

It will then progress to the identification of gas cylinders and how to safely store and handle cylinders and other health and Safety requirements. Thus, enabling participants to competently and confidently use and apply their knowledge to the care arena. Competency of Practice will be outlined and explained.



Assessment

The learners will complete a knowledge assessment at the end of the course to demonstrate their learning and understanding. This can then be included in their portfolio of evidence to support their evidence of continuing professional development. Following the course, participants will have to undergo a competency assessment in their workplace.

The content of the module will include anatomy, physiology, and patho-physiology underpinning minor illness and the assessment and management of these patients. The course will progress candidates towards a safe standard for practice in the management of adults with a minor illness and injuries. Attendees will then be ready to gain competency when returning to their place of work. Aimed at Nurses & AHPs working in Walk-In Centres, Urgent Care Centres, Minor Injury Units, Primary Care, General Practice, Schools and Accident & Emergency.



Assessment

The course should be delivered through a series of interactive lectures, workshops and skills sessions. The content of the module will include anatomy, physiology, and pathophysiology underpinning minor illness and the assessment and management of these patients. A short knowledge assessment will take place at the end of the course. A Certificate of Attendance will also be issued, valid for 1 year.

The course will also summarise the competency requirements to undertake this skill and how to evidence competency within the work place.

We will cover the principles of taking observations (soft signs) including normal/ abnormal ranges, how to respond to abnormalities, and how to escalate concerns. The session will also build on the theoretical knowledge learnt in the first section of the training and will cover the practical steps required to assess and recognise the early softsigns if a resident becomes unwell.

There is no formal assessment as part of this course however learners will be continuously observed and monitored by the tutor while practicing. There will also be a knowledge assessment quiz at the end of the course.

The training will link to national guidance, policies and protocols that are applicable to measuring information objectively. The course will also equip learners with appropriate handover tools for escalating issues.

Learners will complete a knowledge assessment at the end of the course, along with practical tasks throughout the day allowing them to gain the confidence and competency in assessing a deteriorating patient using the A-E assessment protocol. A further 1 day can be provided where full assessment and skills based practice is included in simulation, although this does not form part of the main learning objectives.

When delivered virtually, theory will only be covered.



Assessment

There is a written knowledge assessment required on this course, at the end of the training to allow them to evidence their understanding and a certificate of attendance will be issued to support this assessment and both can be used within a portfolio of CPD. A practical session will complete the course when delivered face2face to enable candidates to start their competences.

- List the regularly used medications to treat respiratory conditions.
- Review the correct inhaler techniques and the different monitored dose systems that are available
- Describe the best practice for managing asthma and COPD
- Discuss the effects of a respiratory condition on the patient, their families and carers
- Be proficient at using a Spirometer

Understanding of how to support young people reporting suicidal thoughts is vital for anyone who works in a safeguarding position. This training will closely follow DSCB Suicide and Self Harm (Level 3)



Assessment

As this is a theoretical course a knowledge assessment will also be carried out at the end of the day. The tutor will be actively monitoring and reviewing the learner's contributions and understanding throughout the session with a series of group work exercises and discussions



- Describe self-harm and suicide tendencies and the underlying reasons for it
- Demonstrate how to act sensitively and appropriately in supporting each child or young person to be emotionally well

- List distraction techniques which may be useful when supporting young people

Demonstration of setting the subcutaneous administration will take place and delegates will have tht opportunity to contribute to this.



Assessment

A Knowledge Assessment will take place at the end of the session, supervised by our Tutor allowing delegates to return to the workplace and put to practice what they have learnt, until deemed competent within their organisations guidelines and protocols. A Certificate of Attendance will also be issued, valid for 3 years.

Learners will be able to practice the clinical skills in a safe learning environment before undertaking them in clinical practice.

Suicide is a major public health concern, and it is growing! This course has been designed to help gain an understanding of what the main risk factors are, who is most at risk, how they may present and how you may be able to better handle these distressing situations.



Assessment

Delegates will be assessed continuously throughout the session by the Tutor in order to be issued with a Certificate of Attendance.



- Understand the need for further, more in-depth training to be delivered due to the growth of this behaviour
- Identify those who are at risk Identify risk factors
- Be able to potentially assist someone in securing more appropriate help
- Be aware of organisations that you may be able to signpost to

- Assist in recognising what further training may be required

Supporting Autistic People and/or People with a Learning Disability

This awareness session on learning disability, autism and autistic spectrum will equip staff members with the essential knowledge of the definitions, history and demographics of the disorders. It encompasses the Oliver McGowan framework and goes beyond as it meets the needs of all 3 tiers of staff. It will list and explore the Core Capabilities Framework for supporting individuals with Autism. It will also discuss with the staff the associated characteristics, abilities, symptoms and some of the challenges that are potentially faced when caring and supporting for individuals. It will also highlight examples of good healthcare practices and some of the negative experiences and stereotypes that are applied to individuals who have a learning disability and/or autism.



Assessment

There is no formal assessment of this awareness session, although the trainer will utilise a range of teaching and assessment strategies to ensure the development and understanding of the learning outcomes. Learners will complete a knowledge assessment following the completion of the course, allowing them to demonstrate an understanding of Learning Disabilities, and/or Autism, and how to provide care and support for individuals.



Learning Outcomes

- · What do you know about learning disabilities, and autism
- Recognise the presentation, behaviour and identity of people with a learning disability and /or autism
- What effects a learning disability and/or autism has on the individual and their families ?
- The need for clear communication and ensuring it is person centred
- List and explore the Autism Core Capabilities framework for supporting an individual with autism
- Discuss the demographics around an individual with learning disability and/or autism
- Define the associated characteristics of individuals with a learning disability and /or autistic or ASD
- Recognise, respect and value individuals with a learning disability and /or autistic differences and challenges negative stereotyping
- Highlight good person-centred practices for caring and supporting individuals with a learning disability and /or autism and respond with respect and compassion
- Demonstrate positivity, recognising the strengths and abilities of individuals with a learning disability and /or autistic
- Describe managing the behaviour that challenges of individuals with learning disabilities and /or autistic

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Syringe Driver - Full Day

This full day version of this course is available for new practitioners who have not used syringe drivers before, this will allow the learners to gain all of the required knowledge relating to medication compatibility, the legal and professional considerations around using Syringe Drivers, as well as practical experience of setting up and using a McKinley T34 Syringe Driver. Including building upon the knowledge and skills associated with caring for an individual who requires this for symptom management.



Assessment

Learners will complete a knowledge assessment at the end of the course. allowing them to evidence their understanding and continuing professional development, followed by a simulated assessment using the competency document after their practical session. They can then return to their workplace with the second part of this for assessment and competency sign off after further exposure to the clinical skills.

- Review the procedure for setting up a McKinley T34 syringe driver
- Identify the potential sites to use when setting up a syringe driver and where to avoid
- Recognise the medications that can be used within a syringe driver, and the symptoms they can help with
